7-Bag

Last weekend Inter-Actief's bi-annual LAN party was held, with NostalgIA as a (repeat) theme. It was only fitting that the mystery game chosen for the occasion was Tetris, a timeless classic and the best games ever created. Those of you who know me might know how much I enjoy Tetris and if you know me well, you also know that I suck at classic Tetris compared to modern Tetris. This is because of many differences, including but not limited to the lack of a hold feature, the shorter queue for upcoming Tetrominoes and maybe most important of all; The 7-Bag.

The concept is of 7-Bag is simple, there are seven unique Tetrominoes and you grab them out of the bag one by one until it is empty and then you fill it again which creates 7! = 5040 different permutations. And this system of the 7-Bag has been part of all

licensed Tetris games (and many unlicensed ones as well) since 2001, meaning you have likely unknowingly played with this as well. 7-Bag ensures that the initial seven blocks are always unique and that the longest you could go without any piece is 12 Tetrominoes. This opens the door to consistently performing techniques such as a 4-wide, a T-Spin Triple set-up and Perfect Clears.

These techniques make a substantial difference when competing. A Perfect Clear (PC) for example is when you clear the entire board, which has an 80%+ success rate due to the predictability of 7-Bag. Clearing a Tetris (four lines) generally sends four lines to your opponent, doing a PC, which is usually also only four lines, sends 10. So do not underestimate the power of 7-Bag and knowing how to use it. And if you ever want to practice feel free to send me jstris link!

Rat Poison


Puzzle!
